#### **Green Our Planet Hydroponics Grant**

Project Green was recently awarded Green our Planet's Hydroponic / STEM grant for three of our schools! These grants include turnkey indoor garden hydroponic systems that can be used as living laboratories, which help inspire students to become the next generation of scientists, farmers, chefs, and entrepreneurs. Currently, these hydroponics systems are up and running at Jackson Elementary, Lake Forest Elementary and Marina Village Middle School. These amazing units allow students to grow a variety of vegetables and herbs in water only. The Grant totaled approximately \$24,000 in materials.

We are so thankful to partner with local Eagle Scouts and Girl Scouts (who are almost always former students!) on projects that immensely improve and enhance our school garden sites. Some recent projects have included muchneeded deer fencing, complete rebuilding of garden beds, irrigation system repairs, beautiful outdoor education sites for students, and much more.

We are thrilled to welcome Linda Meyers, a retired Marina Village Middle School History teacher and Heidi Broadbent, who have both signed on to help teach garden lessons.
